- Keep mom on a healthy diet and regular vet checks.

- Be prepared to help and to call the vet if things don't go smoothly.

Those first 8 weeks are crucial. Puppies need warmth, food, and gentle handling.

Start socializing them early — introduce different sounds, textures, and safe experiences so they grow into confident dogs.

Stick to the vaccination and deworming schedule.

Step 7 — Finding the Right Homes

Not every person who wants a puppy should get one.

Screen potential owners to make sure they understand the responsibility.

Give them a puppy care guide and use a sales contract that protects both the puppy and you.

Step 8 — Treat it Like a Business (Without Losing the Heart)

- Register your kennel name and puppies with official bodies.
- Keep good records of health, expenses, and buyers.
- Use social media and your website to share updates but always focus on quality over quantity.
